

JANUARY MISSION FOCUS - HUMAN RELATIONS SUNDAY

Today (January 18, 2026) is Human Relations Sunday, one of six churchwide Special Sundays designated to support ministries and causes important to the United Methodist Church. Human Relations Sunday supports the Church's work in creating communities where everyone can flourish. When we give, we support church-based programs that work in local neighborhoods to build justice, offer hope, and walk alongside those who need a second chance.

HOW ARE HUMAN RELATIONS SUNDAY OFFERINGS USED?

- **Community Developers Program (57%)** - This program helps churches serve their neighborhoods—especially communities of color—by focusing on local needs like education, employment, and empowerment.
- **United Methodist Voluntary Services (33%)** - This program equips volunteers and congregations to tackle injustice through hands-on projects, community organizing, and service-learning opportunities.
- **Youth Offender Rehabilitation Programs (10%)** - These church-supported programs help young people rebuild their lives through mentoring, leadership training, and positive, faith-based community experiences.



THINK ABOUT IT - THE SACRED NEIGHBORHOOD

It's easy to imagine that God's work is happening somewhere else—in a different town, a different church, a different moment in history. We can find ourselves longing for a place that feels easier, safer, or more receptive, while overlooking the very community where we have been planted.

The people of Israel felt that same tension while living in exile. They wanted to go home. Instead, God instructed them to build houses, plant gardens, raise families, and seek the well-being of the city where they lived. Not someday. Not somewhere else. Right there. Their ordinary, imperfect place became the location of faithful living.

Jesus echoes that same call when he describes his followers as salt and light. Salt doesn't work from a distance, and light only matters where there is darkness. Loving our neighbors—our actual neighbors, in real places—is not extra credit for faithful people. It is sacred work. This Human Relations Sunday reminds us that honoring the dignity of every person and seeking the good of our community are central to living our faith.

REFLECTION QUESTIONS

- When you think about your neighborhood or community, what feelings come up first?
- Where do you see signs of hope, struggle, or need around you?
- Who are the neighbors you interact with most often—and who do you tend to overlook?
- What does it mean to seek the good of your community, not in theory, but in practice?
- How might seeing your neighborhood as holy ground change the way you show up?

PRACTICE FOR THE WEEK

Choose one intentional act of neighbor-love this week. It might be checking in on someone nearby, writing a note of encouragement, sharing a meal, volunteering with a local organization, or giving to a ministry that supports vulnerable neighbors. As you do, pray for your street, building, or community—by name.

PRAYER FOR THE WEEK

God of every place, you have placed us here, among these neighbors and this community. Open our eyes to see where love is needed and where hope is already growing. Give us courage to listen, compassion to care, and wisdom to seek the good of the place we call home. Shape us into people who live our faith through love and justice, right where we are. Amen.

INVITATION

This week, resist the urge to look somewhere else for meaningful faith. Instead, receive your neighborhood as holy ground. Trust that God is already at work here—and inviting you to be part of that work, one neighbor at a time.
